Interview with Jane Hodge

Many changes are taking place at the WSU Libraries, and one of the most noticeable is the reorganization of the Access Services areas. **Jane Hodge**, formerly the Circulation Day Supervisor and a member of the WSU Libraries staff since November 1992, accepted the new position of Access Services Manager in November 2005. She now oversees the Circulation, Reserve, Interlibrary Loan, and Stacks Maintenance departments. To put these changes in perspective, Jane has kindly answered a few questions about her position, her goals, and the future of Access Services.

G.B. (Gemma Blackburn) Jane, you have taken on many new duties recently which have certainly kept you on your toes. Can you tell us a little about these changes, and which aspects of your new position you feel differ the most from your previous job? Also, do you see any difference in your level of public interaction?

J.H. (Jane Hodge) *Communicating with and supervising four departments instead of one is challenging, and it has certainly made me become more efficient in managing my time. I had to break down and get an appointment book! Learning more about Interlibrary Loan has been one of my focal points, because I didn't have much experience in that area. I think the ILLiad [Interlibrary Loan Internet Accessible Database] software is fascinating—it's so efficient and user-friendly. I certainly can appreciate how it's cut down on paper filing, and it makes tracking requests much easier. We've begun utilizing the Document Delivery segment for delivering articles to distance users. I definitely spend less time interacting with the public, which sort of makes me sad. I really enjoy helping patrons and working with the international students especially. These days, I spend more time in meetings and doing administrative work, which isn't nearly as personally rewarding (or fun!)*

G.B. Many new projects have been planned for the Access Services areas in the near future, and some new services have already been introduced. Could you tell us a little about these projects, and how the public may benefit from them?

J.H. *The library opened two new seminar rooms last November. They're equipped with tablet PCs with smartboard software, wireless digital projectors, DVD and VCR players, and a mobile videoconferencing unit. Students, faculty, and staff can reserve the rooms online or in person and use them for training sessions, practicing PowerPoint presentations, or any other educational purpose. We expect them to become very popular, the way laptops were when we began checking*

them out to students about four years ago. Of course, more students have their own laptops now, but the seminar rooms are great



for collaborative projects. The library is also working on the university's move to the new "myWSU" portal. This is a Website that will allow students, faculty, and staff to customize and personalize their access point to the WSU Web pages. They'll be able to control the content and layout of whatever tools and resources they want to be displayed when they sign onto their Website. That sort of flexibility and control is attractive to many people.

G.B. Technological advancements are also impacting Access Services. Which technological advancements do you think may make the greatest impact in the future? Do you see a public demand for any specific new technologies?

J.H. *Of course, digital format is the big thing—not just books and journal articles, but even digital service. Podcasting! iTunes! Videos! Everybody wants everything to be available electronically, and the tough question is how do you keep up? How do you educate your users who may not be familiar with the different file formats or may not have the proper equipment to make them work? How do you deal with the access vs. copyright issue? Plus you have to keep the front line staff informed because they're the ones getting all the questions. It's a little overwhelming to think about sometimes.*

G.B. Finally, could you tell us about any personal goals you may have for your position and for the Access Services department in general?

J.H. *I'm learning so much every day, and it makes me want the same for all the people I supervise. I want to encourage their professional development as much as possible, and I want them to be engaged and challenged by their jobs. Being stagnant is a terrible thing.*

Wichita State University Libraries News

Wichita State University Acquires Manuscript Collection

Mary Nelson, Library Assistant in the Department of Special Collections, is pleased to announce the recent acquisition of a notable manuscript collection.

The Walton and Van Ray Morgan Papers include materials documenting the careers and interests of both individuals. Walton Morgan was the first, and, at the time, only African American in the Wichita North High Band during the late 1930s. While in high school, he formed "The Synopators," one of Wichita's earliest known pre-World War II jazz groups. After serving in the Army, Morgan returned to Wichita and taught in the public school system for over thirty years, earning the moniker "Mr. Music" from his students.

The collection includes photographs, correspondence, sheet music and other materials that document these phases of his life. Van Ray Morgan, a former runway model, is represented in the collection by Le V'Ray Coquettes Studio, the modeling and charm school she began in 1960. The collection includes photographs of her models and a sampling of teaching methods used.

Dr. Breivik will present at the 2006 WheatShocker Seminar

Wichita State University is conducting another Wheatshocker Professional Development Seminar this year. You may remember that last year the speaker was **Camila Alire**, who spoke about marketing, a topic of interest to a broad range of libraries. This year's target audience is higher education librarians and classroom faculty.

Dr. **Patricia Senn Breivik**, a nationally recognized expert on information literacy, will be presenting a seminar entitled, "The Grand Partnership: Librarians and Faculty Enhancing Student Learning Outcomes." Dr. Breivik is past chair of the National Forum on Information Literacy, an umbrella group of over 65 national organizations concerned with the need for people to be able to access and use information effectively, and is past President of the Association of College and Research Libraries.

Dr. Breivik will present the seminar on the WSU campus 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m., Monday, April 10, 2006. This will be a lively, hands-on, interactive event examining the cooperation of librarians with other campus faculty. Registration is limited to 80 participants.

The seminar is sponsored by Wichita State University Libraries and is funded in part by the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Research. This year we are pleased to welcome as co-host the WSU Center for Teaching and Research Excellence.

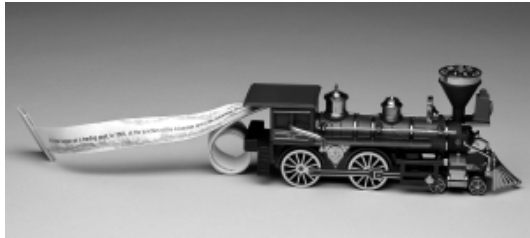

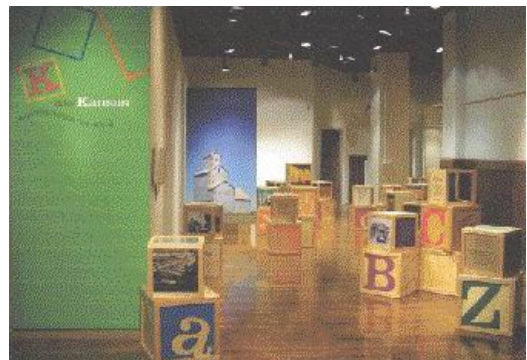
