### WALA Eats: Pecan Pie Bars

#### Filling

4 Eggs  
1 1/2 Cups Light or Dark  
Corn Syrup  
1 1/2 Cups Sugar  
3 Tablespoons melted  
margarine  
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla  
2 1/2 Cups chopped  
pecans

#### Crust

3 Cups flour  
1/2 Cup sugar  
1 Cup margarine  
1/2 teaspoon salt



*Pecan Pumpkin Pie Bars*

Grease bottom and sides of 15 x 10 x 1 inch pan.

**Prepare Crust:** In large bowl with mixer at medium speed, beat flour, sugar, margarine and salt until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Press firmly and evenly into pan. Bake 20 minutes @ 350 degrees.

**While crust is baking, prepare filling:** Prepare in large bowl. Stir eggs, corn syrup, sugar, margarine and vanilla until blended. Stir in pecans. Spread evenly over hot crust. Bake in 350 degree oven 25 minutes or until set. Cool on wire rack. (Makes 48 bars)

Former Kansas State Senator U.L. "Rip" Gooch will be at the Derby Public Library on Tuesday, March 8 from 7:00 – 8:30 p.m. for a book signing and to discuss his book *Black Horizons*. Copies of the book will be available for sale. *Black Horizons* explores the life challenges Gooch faced growing up at a time when racial bias limited the opportunities afforded him. Gooch earned his pilot's license shortly after World War II and had a great love for flying. Racial prejudices kept him from flying full time. He persevered and at one time owned an aviation company in the Air Capitol called Aero Services. Gooch is a member of the Kansas Aviation Museum board and an inductee into the Black Aviation Hall of Fame. His story is an inspiration to many.

## WICHITA PUBLIC LIBRARY OFFERS PRIZES TO READING ADULTS

The Wichita Public Library's 8<sup>th</sup> Annual Adult Winter Reading Program, "Reel Reads," challenges adults to read books and win prizes. This year's program focuses on books that have been made into movies. The program runs Jan. 10-March 10 at all Wichita Public Library locations.

For each book read, participants age 16 or over may enter to win in monthly drawings for Warren Theatres movie tickets and Friends of the Library book bags. After a participant reads six books, the reader earns a finisher's prize of a Wichita Public Library mug, a bag of popcorn, a teabag, a cocoa packet, and a \$5 gift certificate to the Friends of the Wichita Public Library Used Bookstore. The reader may also enter the grand prize drawing for an overnight stay for two at the Castle Inn Riverside, \$50 Visa gift cards, or gift certificates from local merchants.

On Thursday, March 3rd at 7:00 p.m. Clare Vanderpool, local author of "Moon Over Manifest" will be at Derby Public Library.

This is a program recommended for children 8-12 years and for parents or interested adults.



Grand Prize winners will be announced at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday, March 12, at the Central Library, 223 S. Main, in a public party with coffee and doughnuts for all Reel Reads participants.

## **PUBLIC LIBRARIES USE NEW AUTOMATION SYSTEM**

Fourteen area public libraries recently began using a new Polaris automation system as part of the South Central Kansas Automation Network (SCKAN). The SCKAN database currently encompasses nearly 255,000 items from the collections of participating public libraries. SCKAN is administered by the South Central Kansas Library System (SCKLS) in South Hutchinson.

According to Larry Papenfuss, SCKLS Director of Information Technology, *"The SCKAN Consortium has provided participating member libraries and their users' access to one of the premier library automation systems in the country. SCKAN offers an automation system to participating member libraries that normally could not afford such high-end features. SCKAN allows users more control over their accounts so they can place their own reserves, renew items and view their current checkouts from home or anywhere they have access to a computer and the Internet. SCKAN member libraries are a consortium and are better able to negotiate affordable pricing and discounts. By working together as a group, SCKAN member libraries have enhanced user access to their local library collections and increased the sharing of library materials in our region."*

Participating SCKAN member public libraries include Arkansas City, Augusta, Burrton, Cheney, Clearwater, Colwich, El Dorado, Haven, Moundridge, Mulvane, Rose Hill, Sterling, Towanda and Whitewater. SCKAN is funded in part by grants from the federal Library Service and Technology Act (LSTA), SCKLS and participating libraries. SCKLS provides grants, continuing education, consulting and cost-effective support services to 149 member libraries in twelve 12 counties.

One of the first places in the nation to offer this program, Wichita's program attracts hundreds of film fans each year. All showings are free.

The series opens at the Orpheum Theatre, 200 N. Broadway, at 10 a.m. on Saturday, Feb. 26. The program's originator, Sondra Koontz, will return to host. Animated, live action and documentary categories will be shown. All three categories of films will be shown again at the Warren Old Town Theatre, 353 N. Mead, at 10 a.m. on Saturday, March 5.

Branch library showings will feature animated and live action shorts.

A showing at the Central Library at 5 p.m., Thursday, March 3, will showcase documentaries exclusively.

Films are not rated and may not be suitable for all audiences. Running times will vary. (At press time, nominees have to be announced.) Audience members are encouraged to vote for their favorites so the Library can determine if Wichita's favorites match the Academy's winners.

The 25th Annual Academy Award Shorts® yearlong celebration, which began in April 2010 with a presentation by Academy Award® winner Roger Ross Williams, has been made possible by the Friends of the Wichita Public Library. The City of Wichita, the Wichita Public Library Foundation and the National Endowment for the Humanities also make these events possible.

## Bennett to Retire

Judy Bennett, director of Derby Public Library, has announced that she will retire March 11. Bennett has been director at Derby for the past 16 years. Prior to working at Derby, she worked in various positions with the Wichita Public Library and Wichita Public Schools.



Bennett has been instrumental in bringing about many changes to the Derby Library including overseeing the library's move in 2009 to a new facility located at 1600 E. Walnut Grove. The state-of-the-art facility has seen significant growth in usage. The most impressive increase in usage has been in the area of technology. The computer lab and the wireless connectivity throughout the building have tripled the use of technology over the old facility.

The new facility has also become home to the Gathering Space Gallery where art work from throughout the state has been on display. Exhibits this past year included photography, oil paintings, quilts, and artwork by USD 260 students.

In notifying the Derby Library Board of her decision to retire, Bennett wrote "I am humbled and honored to have been the Library Director at Derby Library and to help construct a beautiful and functional building that has and will continue to expand services. It is time for someone else to assume the leadership role who will, hopefully, build on what has been accomplished during my tenure."

A retirement reception will be held in the Community Room at the Derby Library on Thursday, March 10 from 4 to 6 pm. The public is invited to attend.
